## South Korea

### All travellers to present negative COVID-19 certificate upon arrival *(Translated from Korean)*

Ministry of Culture, Sports and Tourism | 22 February 2021

With effect from 24 February 2021, all travellers including Korean nationals will be required to present a negative COVID-19 certificate issued within 72 hours from their departure time. Korean nationals and long-term visa holders will also be required to undergo another COVID-19 test within 24 hours upon their arrival. This test will be arranged by the relevant district health authorities.

## **Automatic 30-day visa extension for foreigners who have legally stayed for 180 days or more**

National Immigration Agency | 5 February 2021

The National Immigration Agency (NIA) has announced the eighth automatic 30-day visa extension for foreigners who entered Taiwan on or before 21 March 2020, and have not overstayed their allowed duration of stay (including their initial visa duration and all previous extensions).

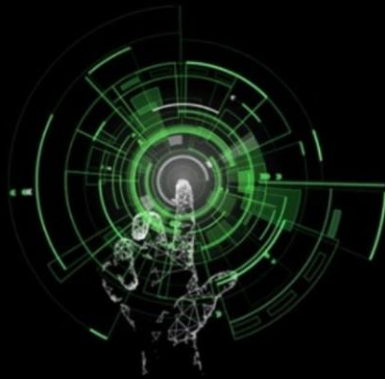
