

### Latest updates to border measures

Ministry of Foreign Affairs of Japan | 6 April 2022

With effect from 8 April 2022, visa exemption measures will be suspended for the following 14 countries/regions: Albania, Bolivia, Brazil, Canada, Chile, Ecuador, Mauritius, Montenegro, Morocco, North Macedonia, Panama, Serbia, Turkey, and the United States.

In addition, with effect from 8 April 2022, 106 countries/regions will no longer be subject to the denial of permission to enter Japan. Currently, foreign nationals who have stayed in any of the 159 countries/regions within 14 days prior to their application for landing are denied entry to Japan, except under exceptional circumstances.

### **Singapore**

Travellers entering Singapore via land checkpoints not required to show physical copy of vaccination certificate

The Immigration and Checkpoints Authority (ICA) has clarified that travellers entering Singapore via the land checkpoints from Malaysia are not required to produce a physical copy of their COVID-19 vaccination certificate.

Returning Singapore citizens, permanent residents and long-term pass holders who were vaccinated in Singapore are not required to produce a physical copy of their vaccination certificate.

Residents and foreign visitors who were vaccinated overseas, and have successfully uploaded their digital vaccination certificates while submitting their SG Arrival Card, are also not required to produce a physical copy to ICA officers.

# All Singapore-bound travellers can now take a virtually supervised COVID-19 antigen rapid test (ART)

All travellers, except short-term visitors, flying into Singapore from any country/region can now fulfil their pre-departure COVID-19 test requirements through a virtually supervised ART. These travellers will have to take the tests through a list of approved service providers, and should use only ART kits that are approved for distribution or use in Singapore or the relevant countries/regions.

Short-term visitors, such as tourists, will still be required to present COVID-19 test results from an overseas testing centre.

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
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
